What is the problem?

The 2009 San Diego Youth Risk Behavior Survey indicates that among high school students:

Cigarette Use

- 44% ever tried cigarette smoking. (1)
- 12% smoked cigarettes on at least 1 day during the 30 days before the survey.
- 3% smoked cigarettes on 20 or more days during the 30 days before the survey.
- 2% smoked cigarettes on school property during the 30 days before the survey.
- 49% did not try to quit smoking cigarettes. (2)

Other Tobacco Use

- 2% used chewing tobacco, snuff, or dip on at least 1 day during the 30 days before the survey.
- 1% used chewing tobacco, snuff, or dip on school property on at least 1 day during the 30 days before the survey.
- 9% smoked cigars, cigarillos, or little cigars on at least 1 day during the 30 days before the survey.

Any Tobacco Use

• 14% smoked cigarettes; smoked cigars, cigarillos or little cigars; or used chewing tobacco, snuff, or dip on at least 1 day during the 30 days before the survey.

What are the solutions?

Better health education • More family and community involvement • Healthier school environments

What is the status?

The 2008 San Diego School Health Profiles indicates that among high schools:

Health Education

- 0% required students to take two or more health education courses.
- 70% taught 15 key tobacco-use prevention topics in a required course.
- 93% had a lead health education teacher who received professional development during the two years before the survey on tobacco-use prevention.

Family and Community Involvement

- 41% provided families with health information to increase parent and family knowledge of tobacco-use prevention.
- 62% gathered and shared information with students and families about media or community-based tobacco-use prevention efforts during the two years before the survey.
- 66% worked with local agencies or organizations on efforts to reduce tobacco use during the two years before the survey.

School Environment

- 96% prohibited all tobacco use at all times in all locations. (3)
- 70% sometimes, almost always, or always required students who were caught smoking cigarettes to participate in an assistance, education, or cessation program.
- 59% provided tobacco cessation services for students, faculty, and staff at school or through arrangements with providers not on school property.
- 97% posted signs marking a tobacco-free school zone.
- 54% used the School Health Index or a similar self-assessment tool to assess their policies, activities, and programs in tobacco-use prevention.

- Even one or two puffs.
- Among students who currently smoked cigarettes, during the 12 months before the survey.
- Prohibited the use of all tobacco, including cigarettes, smokeless tobacco, cigars, and pipes; by students, faculty and school staff, and visitors; in school buildings; outside on school grounds; on school buses or other vehicles used to transport students; and at off-campus, school-sponsored events; during school hours and non-school hours.
